Course Overview:

This course gives a basic understanding on the broad perspective on the globalisation process and its impact on furtherance of social Exclusion and social injustice since Globalisation is an uneven and socially unequal process. This course will highlight the process of social Exclusion, its characteristics, dynamics and impact on discrimination, deprivation and isolation of socially excluded sections of the society.

Syllabus

Unit I

Social Exclusion: Definitions, Concepts, Genesis, process and Dimensions, Nature and types - Religious, Racial, Caste, Gender, Ethnicity, Class, Region (geographical/spatial); Multiple deprivations: Cultural, economic, educational, social, illiteracy, Disability, old Age, Migrants, Refugees, Destitutes and LGBT.

Unit II

Different approaches to understanding social exclusion in India in the context of the caste system and persistence of related evils; Theoretical framework: Importance of closure theory (Max Weber).

Unit-III

Social integration: Definitions, Concepts, Patterns and processes of social integration. Economic insecurity. Marginalization and identity; Democracy, representation and accountability under Globalization.

Unit-IV

Globalization: Meaning, Definition, features, Forms, Dimensions, functions and evolution of Globalization. Interface between Liberalization, Privatization and Globalization; Pros and Cons of Globalization:

Unit-V

Agencies of Globalization: WTO, International Monetary Fund, World Bank, Multi-National Corporations (MNCs), Media and Market. Effects of Globalization on Reservation Policy, Health, Education and unemployment; Impact of globalization on social exclusion and social integration and inclusive policies.

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Learning Methods:

Learning methods will involve a text-based reading on Globalisation, Social Exclusion and Social Inclusion Policies, group discussions, audio-visual presentations, seminars and Assignments. Film shows and Videos will be used to learn practical lessons.

Assessment Methods:

There will be three internal continual evaluations and the end-semester examination. Each continuous evaluation is for 20 marks. The first one will be a written test for essay questions. The second one will be an assignment or book review wherein the students will be tested in reading the original texts. The third one will be a seminar presentation of 10 minutes duration and 20 marks will be allotted for four types of oral skills like clarity, confidence, comprehension and tackling discussions each with 5 marks. The final end semester examination will be for 60 Marks.
